DR. PEDRO N. ORTIZ

After a short excursion to New York, Havana, Jamaica and Panama, Dr. Ortiz Commissioner of Health, has returned to take up the arduous duties awaiting him.

Among other honors conferred upon him, Dr. Ortiz was made honorary president of the Medical Congress which was held aboard the *Lapland*.

His addresses given before the Medical Congress and also in New York have been highly commented.

DR. ROBERT A. LAMBERT

Having made a short trip to New York, Dr. R. A. Lambert, Director of the School of Tropical Medicine, returned on the 6th of June.

He reports very satisfactory results from a conference held with officials of Columbia University regarding future plans for the School.

DR. JUAN ITURBE

Following an absence of a few weeks from Porto Rico, Dr. Juan Iturbe of Caracas, Venezuela, stopped over in San Juan for a few days on his way to New York.

While here the degree of Doctor of Sciences (Honoris Causa) was conferred upon him by the University of Porto Rico.

During his short visit here, Dr. Iturbe made several trips throughcut the Island for the purpose of acquainting himself with certain scientific investigations being carried out by the School of Tropical Medicine and of observing the various activities of the Department of Health.

He also gave an illustrated lecture on "A Scientific Excursion through the Interior of Venezuela", at The School of Tropical Medicine.

FATHER GONZALO PALACIOS

The first student to receive the certificate in Tropical Medicine effered by the School of Tropical Medicine of the University of Porto Rico is Dr. Gurbar Singh Sant of Amristar, India, who has been attending the School during the year and has completed the course.

THE LITTLE MOTHERS' LEAGUE

Graduation exercises of the Little Mothers' League of Mayagüez were held recently in that city, at which time thirty-four girls received diplomas as having completed the course of sixteen lessons given to girls from the sixth to the eighth grades. Most of the girls graduated in Mayagüez were members of Troop No. I of the Girls' Scouts of that city.

The Little Mothers' League of Mayagüez is only one of thirteen such groups that have been organized by the Public Health Nursing Service in the various clinics of the Department of Health.

Great enthusiasm has been shown in these classes and not only have the girls in each town followed up the course with marked interest but the fathers as well as mothers of the girls have attended the classes, and especially the graduating exercises of the League in their respective towns.
