Budgetary surplus or deficiency: It may be observed that all families having weekly incomes under \$6, and the group of families with incomes of \$8 to \$8.99 (501 families or 67.2 per cent of the total) have budgetary deficiencies fluctuating from 3.7 per cent to 75.1 per cent. Deficiencies diminish as the income rises. The families having weekly incomes from \$6 to \$7.99 and from \$9 to \$9.99 have a slight budgetary surplus. The only group of families having a surplus of some importance (9.6 per cent) is that having an income of \$10 and over per week.

The data on distribution of income have been presented on a weekly basis. Should we multiply the expenditures of one week by the 52 weeks of the year the budgetary deficiencies in the respective groups would be enormous.

Families Having Land Under Cultivation:

Approximately one-fourth of the families have small farms or plots of varying sizes under cultivation (table 40). As it might be expected, most of the land used belongs to Central Lafayette. Only 9 families have land of their own, and 7 cultivate rented land situated outside the surveyed area. The majority of the farms were from one-fourth to three-fourths of a cuerda\*, and the total land under cultivation was nearly 358 cuerdas. The crops on these farms had an estimated value of \$7,706. Although there were a few of the larger farms on which some cuerdas of sugar cane were cultivated, the large majority were planted in vegetables and other food crops.

Property Owned by Families:

There were 721 families, or 84 per cent of the total, possessing property of one kind or another irrespective of the value of furniture and other home accessories. Sixteen per cent of the families (137 families) do not possess property

of any kind.

The total estimated value of these properties is \$102,778 or \$142.54 per family. The total estimated value of the properties belonging to the 624 families (representing 86.5 per cent of the families having property) of the wage-earners' group is \$53,411.00, or \$85.59 per family. The total estimated value of the properties belonging to the 97

families in the non wage-earners' group—13.4 per cent of the families having property—is \$49,367.00 or \$508.93 per family.

The estimated average value of the property for the families possessing land and house is \$773.36 per family in the wage-earners' group and \$4,579.50 per family in the non-wage-earners' group; for the families possessing land but no house \$760.85 and \$2,024.00; for those possessing house but no land \$104.89 and \$245.48; for those cultivating land ceded by the Central, \$39.00 and \$31.00; and for the landless workers' families \$22.91 and \$162.10, respectively, per family.

Other points of interest brought out by table 41 are: 51.3 per cent of the families in the wage-earners' group possess land or house, or land and house, as against 77.3 per cent in the non wage-earners' group; 39.4 per cent of the families in the wage-owners' group possess livestock and fowls as against 19.6 per cent in the non wage-earners' group. The value of land for all families is 26.6 per cent of the estimated value of all property, while in the wage earners' group it is 17.8 per cent of the total value of property in that group, and in the non wage-earners' group it is 36.1 per cent of the total value of property in group. The total estimated value of livestock and fowls, all families comprised, is 14.0 per cent of the total value of property, while in the wage-earners' group it is 22.8 per cent and in the non wage-earners' group it is 4.5 per cent of the total value of property for that group.

It is of first importance to explain that roughly 92 per cent of the property owned by the non wage-earners' group is possessed by the families of groups IV, V and VI of table 38 above.

Accumulated Debts of Families:

Six-hundred and five families in the wage earners' group, or 81.2 per cent of families in that group, had accumulated debts amounting to a total of \$17,425.58 or \$28.80 per family. Nearly two-thirds of these debts (65.7 per cent) were incurred for food and clothes; 1.8 per cent for medicines, 7.8 per cent for furniture and 16.5 per cent represented the value of

mortgages on land belonging to six families.

Eighty-one families in the non wage-earners' group, representing 71.7 per cent of the families in group, had accumulated debts amounting to \$16,117.30 or \$198.98 per family. Only about 10 per cent of debts in this group were incurred for food and clothes as compared with 65.7 per cent for the same purpose in the wage-earners' group. The highest proportion of debts incurred in this group is for the operation of business (41.1 per cent) and for mortgages (29.8 per cent). The fact that most of the families having debts accumulated in this group are the property owners' families included in group IV, V and VI of table 38 above should be kept in mind.

The accumulated debts in these families probably explain—at least in part—why budgetary deficiencies are continuous-

ly running on.

#### SUMMARY

- 1. The area surveyed is a middle-sized, absentee-owned sugar cane plantation situated in the southeastern part of Puerto Rico.
- 2. The area includes 16.1 per cent of the rural population of the municipalities of Arroyo, Patillas and Maunabo, in which the plantation is located. The population of the area surveyed is very stable, predominantly colored, and very young.
- 3. Most of the houses are wooden, and roofed with galvanized iron. Nearly three-fifths of the houses have from 100 to 299 sq. ft. of floor area and approximately one-half of them have from one to four exterior doors or windows. Half of

the houses are property of the families living in them and two-fifths are property of the Central. The average number of rooms per dwelling is 2.5. More than half of the population live in houses of only two rooms. About one-third of the families have water piped to the house and the rest use water from shallow wells, rivers and streams, and rain water. Forty-three per cent of the houses do not have sanitary conveniences of any kind; about one-half of them have latrines and nearly 5 per cent have water-closet installations.

4. Most of the people have only black coffee or coffee with milk for breakfast, codfish and vegetables for lunch and rice and beans for dinner. Forty per cent of the families do not use milk in their daily diets and the consumption of milk for those consuming it is two-fifths of a pint per person

per day.

5. The most prevalent diseases are malaria, gastrointestinal disorders and tuberculosis. The highest mortality recorded in the three municipalities is from the above-mentioned causes. In Arroyo and Patillas the mortality from malaria is more than double the average mortality for Puerto Rico from the same cause.

- 6. More than three-fifths of the sick persons found in the area were not receiving medical care of any kind.
- 7. The malaria problem is the most serious health problem. Of the cases found, 90 per cent were malaria cases, four-fifths of which were healthy carriers. Nearly four-fifths of the persons examined harbored parasites of one kind or another in their intestines. Of these, 38 per cent had a mixed infestation and 46 per cent were positive for uncinaria. A few advanced cases of tuberculosis were found and nearly three-fifths of the persons tested reacted positively to the tuberculin test. Eight per cent of the samples taken for syphilis gave a positive result.
- 8. The family constitutes the labor unit dependent upon the Central for its existence. Three-fifths of the families are composed of five members or less; the average size of families is 5.1 members. Seventy-nine per cent of the families are normal families consisting of man and woman, or man, woman and children with or without other persons. More than four-fifths of the families have normally dependent persons in them.

- 9. The consensual marriages include 26.6 per cent of the population 15 years of age and older, and 46.6 per cent of the total married population. Almost five of every ten marriages are consensual, three are church marriages and two are civil marriages. Of every ten persons consensually married more than six are colored and nearly four are white.
- 10. Nearly two-fifths of the persons ten years of age and over have never been in school; two-fifths have completed from 1-4 grades in school: 16 per cent have completed from 5-7 grades and only 4.7 per cent have completed the eight grades of the elementary school. More than three-fifths of the population with any grade of instruction have been in school only from 1-4 grades. The proportion of persons with no schooling whatsoever, ascends with age from 13.8 per cent in the age group 10-14 years to 87.3 per cent in the age group 65 years of age and older. Conversely, the proportion of people having completed from 1-7 grades in school is relatively high in the age group 10-14 years (82.8 per cent) and descends with age to 12.6 per cent in the age group 65 years and over. More than half of the heads of families (52.3 per cent) never have been in school and 30 per cent of them have from 1-4 grades of school.
- 11. More than two-fifths (43.5 per cent) of the persons under 15 years of age are illegitimate. Among children under one year of age the percentage of illegitimacy is 58.2 and 52.2 in children 1-4 years of age.
- 12. Of the total number of workers on wages, 80 per cent are unskilled farm laborers and 20 per cent skilled and semiskilled workers. The former work an average of 34.1 weeks and the latter 39.9 weeks during the year. Only 10 per cent of the farm laborers and 41 per cent of the skilled workers have work during the whole year. The average annual income from wages for the farm laborers is \$119.34 and for the skilled group \$349.52. The average annual income per family for all the families in the area is \$259.43 and the average annual income from wages for all wage-earners, \$165.38.
- 13. Nearly two-thirds of the expenditures are spent in food and there are budgetary deficiencies fluctuating from 7 to 75 per cent in all families earning less than \$6 per week.

14. One-fourth of the families have garden plots and more than four-fifths of them possess property of one kind or another. Similarly, more than four-fifths of the families in the wage-earners' group have accumulated debts, two-thirds of which were incurred for food.
